Simple Sausage Hash

Ingredients

- 1 pound bulk pork sausage
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 2 medium carrots, grated
- 1 medium green pepper, chopped
- 3 cups diced cooked potatoes
- Salt and pepper to taste



Instructions

 In a large cast-iron or other heavy skillet, cook the sausage over medium heat until no longer pink; drain. Add the onion, carrots and green pepper; cook until tender. Stir in the potatoes, salt and pepper. Reduce heat; cook and stir until lightly browned and heated through, about 20 minutes. Cut the fudge into squares and store in an air tight container. Fudge can be stored at either room temperature or in the fridge.





"March Birthdays"

- March 2, 1904 Theodor Geisel (a.k.a. Dr. Seuss) As a student at Dartmouth during Prohibition, Geisel was caught hosting a gin-soaked get-together and was banned from the school's humor magazine, the Dartmouth *Jack-O-Lantern*. To keep publishing, he used his middle name as a pen name: "Seuss." The "Dr." came later.
- March 14, 1879 Albert Einstein was a theoretical physicist
 who is widely regarded as one of the greatest scientists of the
 20th century. Einstein developed the theory of relativity,
 which revolutionized our understanding of space, time, and
 gravity. He also made significant contributions to quantum
 mechanics and cosmology.



George & Gracie

George Burns and **Gracie Allen** were an iconic American comedy duo whose partnership spanned <u>vaudeville</u>, film, <u>radio</u>, and <u>television</u> for <u>over forty years</u>. Let's step into their world:

Vaudeville Beginnings:

- George Burns (born Nathan Birnbaum) and Gracie Allen met in 1922 and began performing together at the <u>Hill Street</u> Theatre in Newark, New Jersey.
- Their act continued in small-town vaudeville theaters, and they married in 1926.
- George wrote most of the material and played the straight man, while Gracie portrayed a silly, addle-headed woman a role that became her signature.



From Fourth Billing to Stardom:

- Initially, they were not headliners but shared the bill with other acts.
- Their career trajectory changed when they made their first film, "Damsel in Distress".
- In the early days of talking pictures, studios sought actors who could deliver dialogue or songs, and George and Gracie fit the bill perfectly.

Film and Radio Success:

- They starred in several films, including "Lambchops" (1929), "The Big Broadcast" (1932), and its sequels in 1935 and 1936, as well as "A Damsel in Distress" (1937).
- Their 30-minute radio show debuted in September 1934 as "The Adventures of Gracie", later renamed "The Burns and Allen Show" in 1936.
- The radio series <u>ran on both NBC and CBS until May 1950</u>.

Television Triumph:

- After their radio show ended, George Burns and Gracie Allen transitioned to television.
- Their popular situation comedy, "The George Burns and Gracie Allen Show", aired from 1950 to 1958.
- The show received 11 Primetime Emmy Award nominations and produced an episode ranked No.
 56 on TV Guide's list of the 100 greatest episodes of all time.

Legacy and Love:

- George Burns and Gracie Allen's radio show was inducted into the National Radio Hall of Fame in 1994.
- They were also honored with induction into the Television Hall of Fame in 1988.
- Their incredible love story endured until Gracie's passing in 1964.

So here's to George and Gracie, the dynamic duo whose laughter-filled legacy continues to brighten our hearts!

Fascinating Easter Facts

There's a whole fascinating history behind Easter's most iconic symbols and customs, from elaborate egg decorating to the name itself, which some historians believe predates Christianity—and we've gathered the most interesting ones for you here.

Easter is the Oldest Christian Holiday - Celebrating Jesus's resurrection, the foundation upon which Christianity was built, Easter is one of the most important Christian holy days.

Eggs Were Originally Dyed to Represent Christ's Blood - The tradition of dyeing Easter eggs is said to date back to ancient Mesopotamia. In modern times, it continues on in secular fashion as well as in Orthodox and Eastern Catholic churches, where eggs are dyed red, then blessed and passed out to supplicants.

The Easter Bunny is German - Both hares and eggs were signs of fertility in Germany during the Middle Ages, and it was during this time that the legend of an egg-laying, candy -giving bunny was born. It wasn't until the first Germans immigrated to America in the 1700s that the Easter Bunny became a beloved tradition here.

Dressing Up for Easter is Based on a Superstition - While you might think that dressing to the nines on Easter Sunday is simply a sign of respect for the holiday, that's not the case. At least it wasn't in 19th-century New York, when residents believed that wearing new duds on Easter would bring luck for the rest of the year. These days, it's estimated that \$3.3 billion is spent on Easter finery.

Only a Dozen States Recognize Good Friday - Commemorating Jesus's crucifixion, Good Friday occurs two days prior to Easter. States like New Jersey, Connecticut, and Texas have named it a state holiday, but it has not been designated a federal one.

We Go for the Ears First - It's true. A little more than three-quarters of people say they consume the ears on the chocolate bunny first, with the rest initially eating the feet, tail, or whatever looks appealing at the time. However you slice (bite?) it, you're part of a proud tradition—some 91 million chocolate bunnies are sold every year in the United States.
